Don't just pick a major. Find what you love and discover what you care about.


BEFORE EVERY CERTAINTY



MAKUU

PAACH

PENN IS JUST THE BEGINNING AND IT'S A PRETTY GREAT ONE

PENN IS JUST THE BEGINNING...

It's pretty common to be unsure about exactly what you want to do with your life when you're in high school. It's pretty uncommon to have an idea in high school that becomes your career post-college. It's, in part, why Ellie was skeptical when her professors and colleagues encouraged her to develop an idea she had in an Intro to Engineering class into a business.

FOLLOW YOUR INTERESTS

The concept was deceptively simple: 3D printing chocolate. Using additive manufacturing to create chocolate confections would allow for faster personalization as well as the creation of intricate textures that couldn't be made through traditional chocolate-making.

As it turns out, getting chocolate to flow in machines intended for plastic or metal is a true feat of engineering. But after a lot of troubleshooting, Ellie's company Cocoa Press produces unique 3D printers which do just that.

WORK TOGETHER TO SOLVE PROBLEMS

Ellie came to Penn Engineering fascinated by 3D printing and interested in working somewhere in the additive manufacturing field. Despite her early interest in combining chocolate with 3D printing, midway through her college career Ellie, like many students, was unsure where her path would take her.

When the time came for her Senior Design Project in the Engineering program, Ellie assembled a strong team with complimentary skills and experiences. Fortuitously, the sweet promise of building a machine that could 3D print chocolate aligned well with the team's goals and interests. In the classic Penn spirit

of collaboration, they worked closely with their professor to work through fluid flow challenges, thermodynamic modeling, and various programming, electronics, and mechanical engineering problems. Their work produced the ChocolaTier, Ellie's third iteration of the printer.

BE OPEN TO DISCOVERY

If Ellie's journey with Cocoa Press reads as a clear path to success, her journey with her own identity is less straightforward-in early 2022, she came out as trans. Shortly after coming out privately to friends and family, Ellie came out publicly.

Ellie understands firsthand how important representation is in allowing people to imagine different paths for themselves. It's why it's important to her to be open about her identity, even when that might make things harder. Fortunately, both the chocolate and engineering communities have been supportive and welcoming of Ellie's transition, and Cocoa Press continues to grow under her leadership.

MAKE A DIFFERENCE

As a business owner, Ellie recognizes she has a unique opportunity to use her voice more freely than others because, as she puts it, she can't be fired from her own company. This privilege has encouraged her to be open about her identity and advocate for the causes that are important to her.

"There are a lot of powerful lessons in being trans," she tells us. With 5 years of promoting Cocoa Press prior to her transition, Ellie has a unique experience of now going to the same events and interacting with the same people about her same productand noting a clear distinction in how both she and Cocoa Press are perceived. It's the kind of insight

that can enrich our understanding of how different people move through the world and lead to greater empathy-something Ellie has in spades.

FIND A WAY-OR MAKE ONE

Cocoa Press's-and Ellie's-stories are of perseverance, problem-solving, and discovery. "It's easy from the outside to make it sound like this is just success after success," she shares, but during the COVID-19 pandemic, there were days where it didn't seem like Cocoa Press could move forward.

That's when the company pivoted from supplying the machines that could make otherwise impossible confections to the chocolate itself. Printing and selling chocolates gave her team the experience of being their own customers and thinking of how they could monetize 3D printed chocolates. Putting themselves into their customers' shoes eventually led the team to meeting the right people, and today things are going better than ever before.

In many ways, Ellie embodies the Penn spirit. She thought of something that didn't exist, so she created it. She collaborated with teams that brought different knowledge to the table, so together they could find a way-or make one. She discovered something important about herself and had the courage to embrace it. Through her activism she gives back to her community, fundraising for organizations like Point of Pride and working with LegiAlerts to track anti-trans legislation

around the country. And every day, she is living proof that you don't need to be defined by just one thing.


